FINAL ORDER

At all times relevant to this proceeding, Petitioner received Medicaid benefits on a fee-for-service basis. On May 16, 2023, Petitioner requested a Fair Hearing based on Respondent's termination of applied behavior analysis services.

Pursuant to notice mailed to the Petitioner's Authorized Representative's address of record on June 6, 2023, the undersigned Hearing Officer convened a telephonic hearing on June 30, 2023, at 9:00 a.m. Petitioner's Authorized Representative was not in attendance. After a fifteen-minute grace period, the undersigned took a roll call on the record of the persons in attendance and went off the record at 9:16 a.m.

Rule 59G-1.100(9)(b)(5)(b), Florida Administrative Code, authorizes a Hearing Officer to deny or dismiss a request for a Fair Hearing if the Recipient fails to appear at the scheduled Fair Hearing without good cause.

On June 30, 2023, the undersigned issued an Order to Show Cause (“Order”) why the instant case should not be dismissed for failure to appear at the scheduled Fair Hearing. The Order notified the Petitioner’s Authorized Representative that failure to show good cause on or before July 10, 2023, would result in dismissal of the case.


On July 5, 2023, the Office received a response stating “I [want] to request a different meeting day, if possible, because I had to travel due to an emergency and couldn’t attend the meeting on June 30, 2023.” Rule 59G-1.100(2)(n), F.A.C., defines good cause as “[a]n incident or occurrence which is beyond the control of the movant and which prevents compliance. The Fair Hearing will determine good cause based on the facts and circumstances the movant presents in support of the application for the relief sought.” Examples of good cause include but are not limited to a disabling accident, illness, or declared emergency. Fla. Admin. Code R. 59G-9(b)(5). In this case, the response fails to identify an incident that was beyond the control of the movant and prevented [REDACTED] from being able to notify the Office prior to hearing or call into the hearing at the appointed time to request a continuance.

Based on the foregoing,

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED AND ADJUDGED THAT:

Petitioner’s Fair Hearing request is hereby deemed abandoned, and this matter is now closed.

REVIEW PROCEEDINGS SHALL BE CONDUCTED IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE FLORIDA APPELLATE RULES. THE NOTICE OF APPEAL MUST BE FILED WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE RENDITION OF THE ORDER TO BE REVIEWED.
